in Open Court before me the Subscriber presiding
 Judge of the said Court of Mason County
 personally appears James McBride aged sixty
 nine years (to the best of his belief) resident in
 said County & State who being by me first
 duly sworn according to Law doath on his
 oath make the following declaration in Order
 to Obtain the provisions made by the late act
 of Cong^{rs} entitled and act to provide for
 certain persons engaged in the land and naval
 service of the United States in the Revolutionary
 War that he the said James McBride on the spring
 following the battle of Trenton enlisted in
 Hampshire County State of Virginia in the Company
 Commanded by Captains Williams Vap of the
 12 Virginia Regt. Commanded by Col^o Wood
 of Gen Scotts Brigade that he continued to
 serve in the said service the full term of three
 years following when he was discharged
 at Philadelphia in Pennsylvania
 after which he substituted in the place of
 Jeremiah Gandy for a year & a half which
 he served under Capt David Williams of
 said County of Hampshire State aforesaid
 who served under Col^o Campbell to the Southward
 from which service he was Discharged at Salisbury
 North Carolina
 to which Discharges is that he
 was in the battles of Brandywine Germantown
 and Monmouth and some skirmishing in the
 first term of service and for the second
 term of service

he was in the battle of Rantausprings where he
received a Bayonets wound threw the body - and
a sword wound in the chest and at Camden
battle he received a Bullets wound at the ankle
which fractured the bone and stiffed his leg
to this day and that he is in reduced circumstances
and stands in need of the assistance of his
Country for support and that he is unable
to perform manual labour

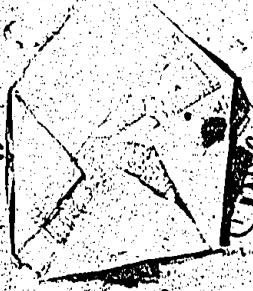
I John Henderson Judge as aforesaid do certify

the Common Enemy and that he is in reduced
circumstances unable to perform manual labour
for subsistence and absolutely stands in need
of the support of his Country

the department of war pursuant to the

directions of the aforementioned
act of Congress the 19th day
Aug in P. 1818.

On the twenty seventh day of September
in the year eighteen hundred and twenty personally
appeared before the superior Court of law for said
County of Marion being a Court of record proceeding
according to the course of Common Law with the
jurisdiction unlimited in point of Amovant
James W. Glaze aged seventy one years, to the best
of his belief, Resident of said County of Marion; who
being first duly sworn according to Law & Oath
on his oath he deposes that he served in the
Revolutionary war as follows; That in the Spring
following the battle of Brantons he enlisted in
Hampshire County, State of Virginia in the Compa-
ny Commanded by Capt. William Voss of
the 12th Virginia Regiment Commanded by Col.
Wood of General Meigs Regiments that this declar-
ant continued in said service for the term of
three years next following when he was disch-
arged at Philadelphia in the State of Pennsylvania
after which discharge he substituted in place of Meigs
Genay for the eighteen months and served under
Captain Isaac Williams of the County of Hamp-
shire and in the Regiment Commanded by Col.
Campbell. From this last service after performing
the same he was discharged at Salisbury in
North Carolina - That entitled himself to a pen-
sion under the acts of Congress in such cases
made and provided he made a declaration

in pursuance of said Acts on the nineteenth day of August in the year eighteen hundred & eighteen -

That under & by virtue of said Acts & declaration he was placed in the list of Revolutionary Pensioners of the United States and his name inscribed on the pension list Roll of the Virginia Agency as more fully appears by his certificate of pension Number 7187 and dated the 5th of March 1819

And I the said James M. Dade do solemnly swear that I was a Natural Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818, and that I have not since that time by gift, sale, or in any manner disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby to diminish it, as to bring myself within the provisions of an Act of Congress entitled "an Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and Naval Service of the United States in the Revolutionary war," passed on the eighteenth of March 1818, and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property or securities, contracts, or debts due to me, nor have I any income other than what is contained in the Schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed and which schedule contains One Horse Three Cows & One Heifer One feather bed and bedding One ~~light~~ wa and Covering One Oven One pot One Kettle six head of sheep and perhaps about twelve head of hogs.

The declarant also states that with the aid of his children he cultivates a small piece of ground but is unable to do much of the manual part of said labor himself. That his family consists of himself his wife and three children one of whom is nearly of age and a son who is infirm.

The second is a boy aged about sixteen years and
small of his age the third is a daughter aged
fourteen in July last

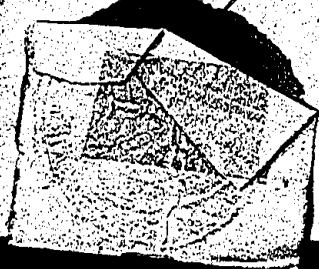

Dear Madam:

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 38193, it appears that James McDade, while residing in Hampshire County, Virginia, enlisted sometime in the spring of 1777, and served three years as a private in Captain William Vause's Company, Colonel Wood's Virginia Regiment, was in the battles of Brandywine, Germantown, Monmouth, and several skirmishes.

Shortly after the above noted service, he re-enlisted and served eighteen months as a private in Captain David Williams' Company, Colonel Campbell's Virginia Regiment. He was in the battles of Kutaw Springs, where he received a bayonet wound through his body and a sword wound on the wrist, and Camden, where wounded on the ankle by a bullet.

He was allowed pension on his application executed August 19, 1818, at which time he was residing in Mason County, Virginia, and was sixty-nine years of age.

In 1820, he referred to his wife and three children,
a son nearly of age, son, sixteen years old and a daughter,
fourteen years old, no names given.

He died June 30, 1833.
